A Year of *Impact*

Since 1995, MITS has continued to learn, grow and expand ways to best serve teenagers from the streets in Kenya. 2022 was an impactful year across all areas of the organization.



Education and Vocational Training

MITS provided educational opportunities and vocational training to 175 homeless youth. Through this program, we equipped them with skills that will enable them to secure jobs and become self-sufficient.

Spiritual Formation

Through Bible classes, church, mentoring, and spiritual counseling, we focus on helping our students find their identity in Christ and know the love of God. Seeing them grow into young adults who trust the Lord and experience His love is what MITS was founded on.

Trauma Counseling

After living on the streets, MITS students have faced rejection, trauma and lack of self worth. We have dedicated programs for individual and group counseling. We also continue to expand our art therapy classes for teenagers at our Eastleigh Centre.

Employment and Community Success

After graduating, MITS alumni are men and women with a licensed skillset and exciting opportunities for employment. Through MITS, they are able to earn a living and become financially independent members of the community.

On the *Streets*

Our Eastleigh Centre provides dedicated, daily programs for boys, girls, mothers and babies living on the streets. In 2022, thousands of teenagers and mothers came to receive love and care. During our mothers program we focused on economic empowerment through teaching basic skills and budgeting.

We continued our focus on art therapy and had our second annual art auction. Proceeds went to the artists and furthering the program. By giving in 2022, you made the following happen...

9,240 meals

were provided to teenagers and mothers in our Eastleigh centre.

45 home visits

brought encouragement to rebuild the lost relationships of street teenagers with their families.

750 visits

from female teens at our Friday girls programs, where they enjoy fun activities and receive health education and resources.

180 days

of base visits allowed our team to connect with and serve over 350 unique teenagers on the streets.

In the *Classroom*

From the ages of 13-15, MITS students receive education in science, math, English, Swahili, Bible and social studies.

After turning 16, they join our Skills program and choose one of the following vocational skills to study for the next 2 years:

Cosmetology, Catering, Hospitality, or Auto Mechanics.

Look what else you helped accomplish last year...

45 teenagers

left the streets and joined MITS boarding school.

120 total students

are enrolled in our boarding school in Kamulu.

4 MITS students

excelled on the national exam and are furthering their education in high school.

12 graduates

completed the MITS program and started jobs in Nairobi.

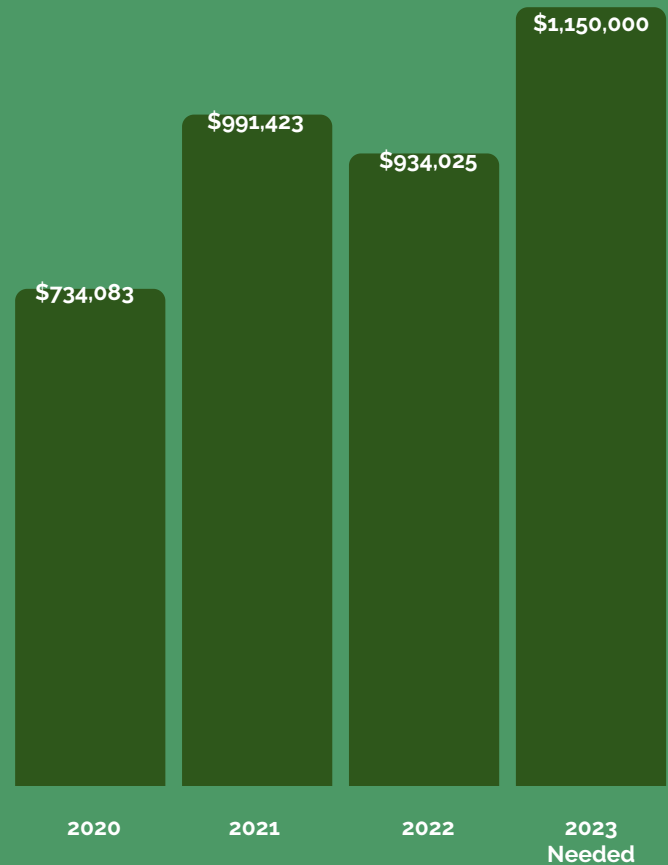

Investments

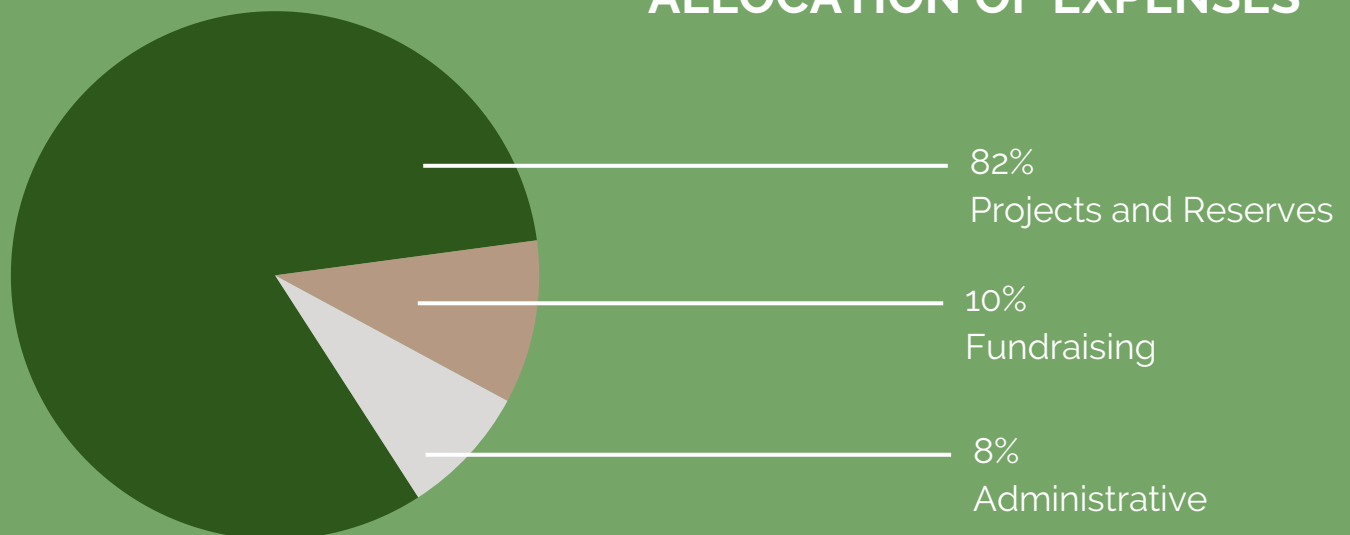
TOTAL ANNUAL GIVING

In fiscal year 2022, total giving to MITS was \$934,025.

During that time \$809,201 was designated to MITS Projects and Reserves; \$75,040 to Administrative costs; and \$99,154 to Fundraising costs.

On the Streets

In January, we started our intake process; this year, we had the highest number of students' intake ever. We managed to onboard 45 street-connected boys and girls off the streets. We did this in two rounds. The first round was 13 boys and 12 girls. The second intake was 12 boys and 8 girls. The goal was to have an intake of 40 new students and we surpassed it by five more.

Even though the UN statistics show there are 60,000 street children, the number has increased. The number has increased and especially after the pandemic due to lost jobs. Even better, we were able to acquire most of the documents through hard work and a lot of traveling. As we work towards ending the cycle, the 45 home visits we did. We encouraged the families and built the lost relationship of the kids with their families.
