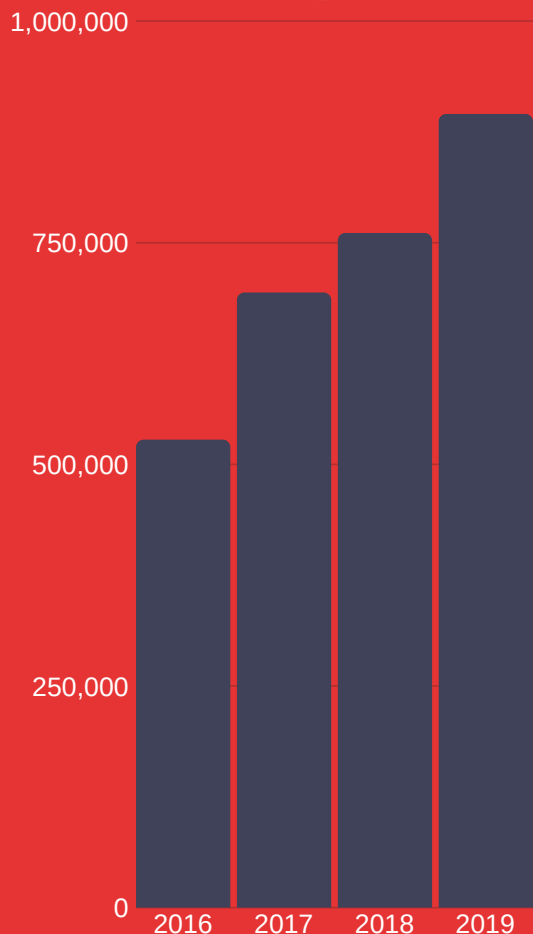

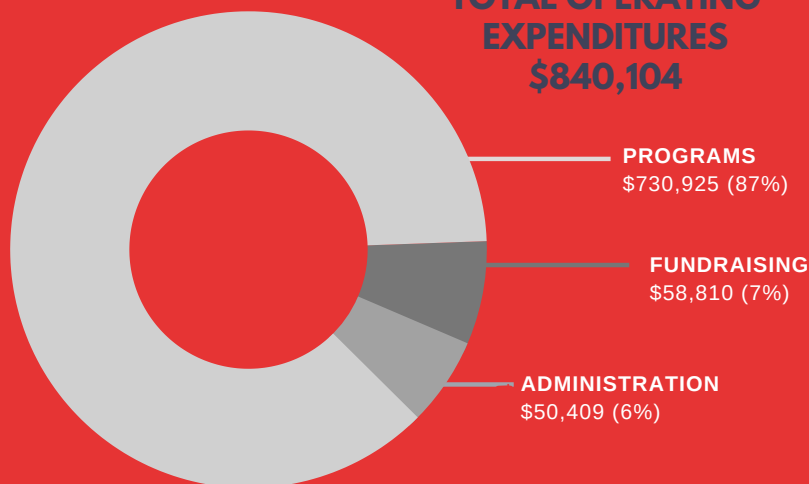

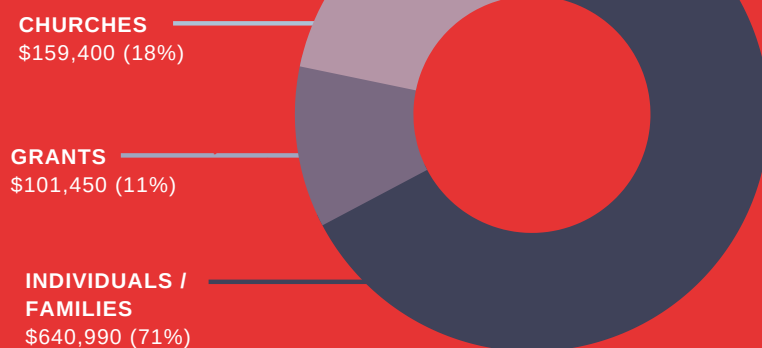
Contribution Growth By Year

Milicent Adhiambo grew up in a poor family in the slum of Dandora.

In her early teens, she found out she was pregnant. Not wanting to disgrace her family, Milicent ran away to the streets and gave birth to her son at the dumpsite.

She discovered the mother's program at MADE IN THE STREETS, started attending, and soon joined the boarding school. As a standout student in her Hairdressing class, she got the opportunity to receive extra training at Unity College.

After getting a job in a salon, she gained her employer's trust and built her clientele. Milicent now works at Concept Salon and Spa in downtown Nairobi, and her boss describes her as "very enthusiastic and fearless."
